EDITORIAL FROM THE BOARD

By the time that this issue goes to the printers we shall have held the Annual General Meeting. During 1999 for various reasons Club expenditure substantially exceeded income, which meant that the deficit had to be met by drawing on financial reserves. That after all is what reserves are for, to be used when necessary. Too soon to say how 2000 with turn out financially.

Subscriptions have been increased, for the first time ever, in peseta terms, although in terms of £, \$, francs and some other currencies, subscriptions are still less than they were ten years ago, without allowing for inflation. So there is, if necessary, scope for another subscription increase without inflicting hardship on any of us.

The weekly Newsletter has been made free, to anyone who comes to the coffee morning or who provides envelopes for postal transmission, still (fortunately for all of us) free of cost within Andorra. It does not seem practicable to send the Newsletter to all members. Why? Because volunteers at coffee mornings can be found every week to put 70 or 80 Newsletters into envelopes. Volunteers can be found at coffee mornings once in three months to put 300 copies of Intercomm into envelopes, label then, sort into parishes, take to the post office. Every week? No way is that possible for the Newsletter. We should all be grateful to these volunteers. Do not take them for granted.

Concerning Intercomm, advertising rates will be increased from the beginning of 2001, and we are having quite a lot of success in collecting arrears of advertising revenue. In principle all future advertising must be paid for before the advertisements go in. This issue, as an experiment is being printed on cheaper paper, as a measure of economy - we don't know how it will turn out. We have taken (temporarily) the decision to reduce each issue to 24 pages instead of 28. The amount of space taken up by advertising is on an uptrend, a result of considerable effort by several people. One consequence (good or bad? we are not sure) is that the Magazine Sub-committee has more contributions than can be published in this issue. In principle Intercomm should in time be self-financing, but some of us have doubts as to whether this is really a practicable, or even a desirable, aim. We are having some success in getting together a better quality

magazine, which entails more expenditure than previously on specialist preparation.

Lunches with U.K. Consul-General

States that belong to the Commonwealth or that were formerly part of its predecessor the British Empire together contain around 2000 million people, or 35% of world population, which is one reason why English is becoming almost a world language, and why it is the preferred language of communication within our International Club. 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St. John's Eve and Catalan Nationalism

Anyone might be forgiven for thinking that 350 years would be long enough for the inhabitants of Pyrenées Orientales to get accustomed to being French rather than Spanish or Catalan. It was in 1659 that France and Spain signed the Treaty of the Pyrenees, ending the Franco-Spanish War of 1648 – 1659, and ceding Roussillon and part of Cerdagne to France. But if you go to the Andorra National library and read the Catalan Encyclopaedia, you will find that Vallespir, Rosselló, Conflent, Alta Cerdenya, and Fenolledar (roughly equivalent to the Pyrenées Orientales) are still considered as Catalan, at least in the cultural and linguistic sense.

In Perpigñan, just as in Andorra and in Cataluña, St. John's Eve (June 23rd) is a night of celebration, when fire is brought down from the sacred mountain, Le Canigou, to light bonfires. In origin this is a celebration of the summer solstice, dating back long before such comparatively recent innovations as Christianity.

Have a look at this action photograph, taken last year, and expect to see similar events in 2000 and 2001. We can't be sure that we will get Intercomm out in time for June 23rd, 2000.

"Falles" about Andorra la Vella streets on St. John's Night 1999. The "falles" are wooden faggots, and this photograph, kindly given by the Centre de la Cultura Catalana of Andorra, shows the spectacular results of "fallaires" movements.



This is one "falla". During all June, there are demonstrations and workshops in schools and elsewhere, to learn about making "falles" and the arm movements to produce the great sparkling balls of fire. This is a very old Andorran and Catalan tradition. Nowadays there are "falles" exhibitions on St. John's night in almost all parishes of Andorra. There is a revival of this beautiful tradition that has been a little forgotten for several years.



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DRIVING IN ANDORRA

Within the context of one of the Club's aims, that of disseminating useful information to its members about various aspects of life in Andorra, I have prepared some guidelines for drivers. They are not all-inclusive but are up-to-date; in fact the procedure relating to yellow cards changed during the writing of this article.

1. <u>ITV - CAR INSPECTIONS FOR</u> ROADWORTHINESS

The procedure for car inspections has changed and I thought it might be helpful to explain the system here:

If your car is 5 years old the Govern's inspection is obligatory and will have to be repeated every 2 years until the car is 10 years old when it must be tested every year.

The inspection site is still the same one, on the Os road in St. Julià, but is now open from 8.30 a.m. – 5.30 p.m. on weekdays. (From 13/6 – 11/9, 8.15 a.m. – 2.45 p.m.)

The cost of each test is Pts. 2,100 whether the result is positive or negative.

You will need to produce up-to-date green (insurance) and yellow (road tax) cards.

On arrival at the depot, drive first to the little office where you pre-pay the test and show your documents.

Then you join the queue. When I went this week I had to wait for over 2 hours as the average inspection rate was 10 minutes per car, with only 2 inspectors on duty. So evidently the promised speedup in testing (and the new, comfortable waiting room) has not materialised.

When it is your turn, you hand over the receipt and the documents to one of the inspectors who then drives your car into the testing area whilst you wait in the windy courtyard outside the payment office for it to be delivered back to you.

If all is well, he puts a sticker on your windscreen indicating when the next test is due; if not, he may explain what needs to be put right but will, anyway, give you the official test report paper with the details. If the car has failed the test you have to return within 8 days with the faults rectified.

When you return for the second (or any subsequent) test, once again the Pts. 2,100 must be prepaid but if you catch the inspector's eye he will tell you where to park, somewhere in front of the office <u>BUT NOT IN THE LONG QUEUE OF CARS</u>, and will process your car within a very short time. It will be necessary to show him the first ITV report, the prepayment slip and the green and yellow cards.

2. IN CASE OF AN ACCIDENT

Most accidents involve two vehicles and two drivers, although in some cases there will be three or more vehicles involved and in others only one driver and vehicle (e.g. driving too fast round a bend and skidding off the road into a tree). But as a general rule, complete the European Accident Statement, of which you should always have a copy in your car. It is a standard document in Europe, of course in various languages. (The above was contributed by Peter Parkinson)

For any accident in Andorra, involving people or vehicles, the parish police (urbans) must be notified straight away.

3. THE HIGHWAY CODE

By bringing its Highway Code up-to-date in August 1999 Andorra aimed to fall in line with the regulations in other European countries. The principal changes are as follows:-

Driving Licences now specify the driver's experience and which categories of vehicle may be driven.

Drivers and front-seat passengers must wear seat-belts at all times. (This will soon apply to backseat passengers as well.) The use of mobile phones, whilst driving, is forbidden. There are now large notices at the borders to this effect. Non-compliance



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with these two regulations carry fines of Pts. 3,000.

As far as 'drinking and driving' is concerned, the top levels permitted for drivers of commercial vehicles, such as lorries, buses, vans and taxis, is 0.2 milligrams per litre and for other drivers 0.5mg./l. If a breathalyser reading is above these limits the maximum fine is Pts. 150,000 with confiscation of the driving licence for 6 months. Refusal to be breathalysed results in a Pts. 50,000 fine.

If speed limits are exceeded the fine is Pts. 15,000.

Finally, an interesting anti-smuggling regulation is included: there are very heavy fines if somebody is caught owning or driving a car with a false bottom or lining.

4 USE OF WARNING TRIANGLES (contributed by Henryk & Solveig Feilberg)

The technical inspection of vehicles in Andorra now also includes checking if you have a warning triangle or hazard triangle.

Any Andorran-registered car must always carry at least one warning triangle. In case of breakdown on the road, the triangle should be placed 150 metres in front of the vehicle and/or 50-150 metres behind. The interpretation of front and behind is not clear, but logically must mean in the direction of the traffic.

The warning triangle may be of the folding type. When readied the three sides of the triangle should be of equal length. Outside measurements of each side should be 50 cm plus/minus 5 cm, with a reflective border all around and raised 5 cm off the ground when in place.

European Standard E1 27R 02 and E1 27R 03 followed by 5 digits refer.

Warning triangles are currently on sale in Andorra at about 1000 pesetas each.

Members are further advised, that the Spanish law requires a minimum of TWO warning triangles. As regretfully some members are aware, fines in Spain start at 50,000 Pts, for foreigners.

5. YELLOW CARDS

The procedure for yellow cards has now been simplified. If you still have a card with an expiry date, a few days before it needs renewing ask your Comú for a 'certificat d'inscripció' which proves you are registered with them. This certificate & the yellow card must then be taken to the Govern's traffic department. After 2-3 days they will give you in exchange a new FINAL yellow card without an expiry date and which you can thus use indefinitely.

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BUILDING AIRCRAFT IN ANDORRA

Tom Mead and I had built an aircraft previously. We did make a flight from the parking lot at the Pal ski station, but the steeply inclined scenery of the Pyrenees, the engine manufacturer's grim warning that it could not be relied upon beyond gliding distance from an airfield and the startled dissatisfaction of the Government, decided us against doing it again.

And then a friend said that he had been flying the BanBi MCR 01 in France.

"It's the most exciting aircraft I've flown since I left the Air Force." He said enthusiastically. He used to fly Canberras in the RAF. "It's a kit aircraft made from carbon fibre, very light and very strong."

He omitted to say 'very expensive'.....

Tom and I drove to Darois, near Dijon and had a quick test flight. The performance was impressive. Climbing out from the airfield, the nose of the aircraft was high enough to obscure the forward horizon, the low cloud base that day prohibited anything too fancy and after a 30 minute flight,

mostly throttled back to keep below the limiting speed of 320 kph, we returned for landing.

The aircraft is advertised as having a range of 1500 kms, or with the optional wing tanks 6000 kms, which also gives an endurance of 23 hours, more than boredom, bottom or bladder could stand, so we considered only the fuselage tank.

It is also expected to get to England, for example, non-stop, with a fuel cost of less than 6000 pesetas.

The only drawbacks I could see were the cost, which was more than I wanted to pay, and the size.

The MCR 01 is the smallest two-seat aircraft in the world, and although the adjustable seat was in its lowest position, I was still about 3 cms short of headroom, and could only fly the plane with my head cranked over sideways, in a stance like a worm-seeking blackbird.

"Perhaps I could cut away some of the framework that supports the seat to allow more headroom." I asked the chief pilot.

Back in Andorra, I attended a meeting of the recently formed Federation of Aviation Sports of Andorra, and circulated the details of the aircraft. Eric Recurt, a French Pilot who was sitting next to me at the table, spoke of an aircraft he wanted to build, a Thunder Mustang, costing ten times my estimate for the MCR. He quickly committed himself to a share, and we started to look for four other investors. We decided we needed six people at FRF 50,000 each.

Manel Campos, our Andorran member, came next, followed later by Mike Leonard, who took a

> flight in the demonstration aircraft in Darois and confirmed my enthusiasm. Howard Hobson, hearing of the project, threw in a share and our last member Juan Payaras arrived at the door with the news that he had already put the money in the bank, which instantly removed any debate about admitting him.

introduced a small problem. Everyone else speaks English, while only Manel, Eric and Mike converse well enough in Spanish or French to talk to Juan. My limited knowledge of those languages only allows me to understand half of the conversations, Tom can converse in French and Howard only in English. It is a polyglot group but we manage to stumble along.

We started work in France on April 7th last year.

At the factory we were presented with all the parts for the fuselage, and two of us easily managed to carry it down a flight of stairs and across the tarmac to the assembly hangar. Any thoughts of home construction vanished when we saw the complexity of the assembly, which needed the factory jigs to ensure aerodynamic accuracy.



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We had to trim the excess plastic from the mouldings using a diamond saw and not knowing that the by-product of cutting carbon fibre is soot. At the end of the day we looked like African coal miners coming off the midnight shift and I revelled in a hair colour I hadn't seen since my twenties. It was a lot like making a plastic model aircraft on a grand scale. Everything, even the seat-belt installation, is held together by epoxy glue, which though very strong, is capable of causing an allergic reaction during application, painfully demonstrated by a fellow builder whose fingers swelled and peeled like overcooked bratwurst. We wore masks and rubber gloves most of the time.

We gave some thought to cutting the frame

that stopped the seat from going lower, but came to realise that the few centimetres of headroom gained might easily translate into several thousand feet headroom if the floor fell out in a high speed turn. so we placed the restricting frames further aft and altered the geometry of the seat support, and gained five cms with the frames intact. The only problem

remaining is the buttock-gripping plastic shell of the seat that promises to restrict arterial flow to the legs after a few minutes, but a restriction on dessert and chocolate during the next few months might take care of that.

One thing that surprised me was the apparent fragility of the parts. The fuselage just behind the cockpit canopy can easily be deformed by finger pressure and the interior of the wings are supported from collapse only by a light-weight expanded foam that would seem more suitable for parcel-packing material. It occurred to me that I have seen corn flakes packed in stronger boxes, and yet the factory says that although it is not licensed for aerobatics, the aircraft is quite capable of them, and I think it is.

We worked in relays at the Darois factory over

the summer of 1999 and by August we had enough done, we thought, to bring the aircraft back to Andorra to finish fitting out. We towed the fuselage and dismantled wings and tail back to our garage in La Massana, and commenced fitting out the interior. Here we met our next problem.

In the factory we gained more information observing other more complete aircraft in the hangar, than we did from the instruction manual which was written in French, and partly in English and German, and totally in confusion.

"No it's not like that. It's been changed" was the common response to queries, and we learned to distrust the book. It did occur to me that our alternative method of looking at others would ensure that a

mistake made by one builder would descend down the production line like a virus, but we are checking very carefully.

The aircraft is nearly finished, and stands in the garage awaiting wiring of the instruments and the fitting of a plastic strip between the wings and the flap, that none of us can understand. Engine testing should start in a few weeks.

We did have an agreement to keep the aircraft at La Seu Airport and, lacking any hangar there, purchased all the

parts to build one, from an agricultural building company, but we have been asked to delay construction while the negotiations are taking place for the restructuring of that airport as Andorra's terminal. Hopefully by the time this is published we might have a favourable decision.

This spring the plane might be test flown at the factory, or the first flight might take place at La Seu or Pamiers depending on licensing in France or Spain, which is still under discussion, but one thing we can promise to both you, and the Andorran Government, who are considering aircraft licensing in the Principality, it won't be at the Pal car park.

This aircraft has much higher takeoff speed and we'd never make it over the trees.

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SALVADOR DALÍ

alí was here in Andorra. "Memòria dels Somnis" Salvador Dalí (1904-1989) was the title of the exhibition which opened on 20th December 1999 at the Govern's Riberaygua Gallery. The exhibition continued until 28th February 2000. This particular collection contained 150 Dali original sketches and illustrations taking us through the age of ten to almost his death. Most of them were courtesy of private collections. It is rare to see so many works of a great artist in one exhibition. The show also had jewellery, sculpture and a chess set. The illustrations for Don Quixote were especially intriguing. I was expecting to see some of his Divine Comedy as well. I imagine, however, that it must have taken a lot of effort and resources to bring to us whatever Dali could be put together. For me and many others this has been the best and most of Dalí in one show. Quite a few of his works are in the United States galleries, museums and private

collections where he exhibited frequently.

I remember when I visited Figueras, Dali's birthplace, I was full of awe and anticipation. I believe quite a few of our readers have been there. I was not only disappointed but also felt lost and confused. It is true that he did work for the theatre and even films. The theatrical murals one finds in Figueras, however, are not all done by Dali. Some of his students and followers or perhaps the tourist industry decided to make a tourist's visit worth while. There was only one room

that contained some of his smaller works.

Some of us like Dali for what he has left for us

- the others keep him at a distance because most of his
works remind them of a nightmare they may have had
or a composite fear of some sad events in the past. Dali
has been an enigma. To get to Dalinian orbit is through
himself. He once said "my work is a reflection, one of

the innumerable reflections of what I accomplish, write and think".

Around 1929 he associated himself with the Surrealists. At this stage he described his pictures as "hand painted photographs". These were adorned with symbols of assorted phobias, delusions and other factors of abnormal psychology – mostly based on Freudian theories. Though Dali was indeed a true advocate of Surrealism, he had to be disowned by the original Surrealist group in Paris. This was partly because of his academic technique and partly because of his personal squabbles and jealousies.

His early training in Spain was academic, being educated at the School of Fine Arts, Madrid. He was very particular almost to the point of madness about acquiring the technique and practice in painting and drawing that the centuries of civilisation had perfected before him. However, Dali's love of

traditional rendering of the past was not "right" at the time when the twentieth century artists are trying to get rid of the past. In spite of the apparent difference in the conceptual thinking, Dali continued to make waves. He was quite an exhibitionist. In the late sixties every other picture magazine printed his latest stunts. Maybe now, it may be possible to look again at a painting by Dali as a painting rather than a sensational news piece. Critics still find it difficult to evaluate him objectively. In spite of all the opposition and the emotional upheavals of his life, he never stopped recounting his tragic myth to everyone and in every circumstance, in Spain, France and America, on the radio, on the television and in the course of

countless private interviews or during his press conferences. He somehow made it impossible to separate the private world of his painting from his public personality.

Regardless of all this Dali is without question

He has been called the Leonardo da Vinci of the twentieth century. Paradoxically, along with Picasso and like him, Dali, the most renowned and representative man of our time, is the most misunderstood and unknown. His work as a poet, a philosopher, and as an aesthete has made its mark on our sensibility, but yet remains to be truly discovered.

By any standard was an arresting craftsman, no matter to what use he puts his talent. His art has also been criticised because of its theatrical elements, well suited to the arts of display - however, cheapened in its surrealist imitation by many. His work has had a strong influence commercial windowdressing and on specialised advertising directed toward a sophisticated audience. Dali had himself designed theatrical sets, jewellery

and indulged in pop art as well. He also collaborated with Luis Buñuel on two significant surrealist films, Un Chien Andalou and L'Age d'Or (1931). After he came to the United States in 1940, he created several ballets and a quantity of commercial illustrations.

Dali was born on May 11th, 1904 at 20 Call Monturiol in Figueras in the province of Girona. In his own biography, (The Secret Life of Salvador Dali, 1942), he talks about his childhood – marked by extraordinary intense emotional experiences, in which many later dreams and obsessions were prefigured – at the age of seven he wanted to be Napoleon!!!

Between 1921 and 1926 he studied intermittently at the Madrid Academy and perfected his technical skill in the tradition of seventeenth century French and Spanish genre painting. In 1927 Dali went to Paris. He paid a visit to Picasso and joined the Surrealist group the following year. Above all he met Gala. She in so many ways, kept him from many emotional and unwise actions. For a very brief period he was influenced by the abstract phase of Picasso and Joan Miró. He soon returned to his earliest interest in the "Metaphysical School" of Italian painting, especially the work of Giorgio di Chirico. According to

Dali, Chirico believed in the investigation of dream imagery in the Freudian tradition – far ahead of Freud himself. Dali's technical precision was admirably suitable to the creation on canvasses of the hallucinatory atmosphere of the dreams. Depicting with great precision familiar objects in illogical settings and combinations.

In 1934 when the Surrealists expelled him

from their group the same year he went to the United States where he found the ideal environment to develop his taste of exhibitionism. When, in 1936 the Spanish civil war broke out, Dali painted a series of violent canvasses before returning to New York where he sold a lot of his work. Being a very complex being and the enigma that he was, for some reason he could not withstand the impact of his success and fled to Port Lligat in the Costa Brava. Fortunately, Gala was there. In 1941 when war broke out in

Europe Gala and Dali both left for the United States.

Late in life his fascination for religion was revived. He met Pope Pius XII and leaned more and more toward Classicism. He painted very large canvasses, illustrated Don Quixote, as he had done the Divine Comedy. He also became interested in creating jewellery and pop objects.

Among his religious Surrealist paintings, possibly the best known are Christ of St. John on the Cross (1951) in the Glasgow Art Gallery and Museum and The Last Supper (1955) shown in the Metropolitan Museum, New York.

To me Dali's art does not or should not need much explanation. Once it is accepted as a dream or vision, it exists, as it should without explanation. No matter what, Dali had an exceptional career as an international painter, being as famous in Spain, the United States and elsewhere in the world. The fantastic nature of his art suggests that he was an eccentric person obsessed by mythomania and megalomania and maybe visions. The fantasies he painted could be intellectual moralities.

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THE PILGRIMAGE TO SANTIAGO DE COMPOSTELA, MAY 1999

major qualification to go on a pilgrimage was having the time, the interest and some energy. A friend of thirty years' duration picked me out as a suitable companion to join her quest and two years ago we went to the major bookshops in London to buy the relevant books on the

pilgrimage to Santiago. Last winter we read all the information we had, wrote to the different Tourist Offices in Spain, downloaded info from the Internet and corresponded by email over the winter. Sixty-eight emails or so later, we had planned a route, detailed the exact clothing we would need and got the luggage in theory down to 8kgs each. We put aside the month of May for the trip as it

was before the busy summer season when water shortages can occur, April could bring bitter winds across the plains and in May the flowers would be emerging, so May was settled on. Due to the work constraints of my friend we would have to cycle as she only had three weeks holiday. In February I acquired a bicycle, and was to be seen practising twice a day on the road from Erts to La Massana and a few other points beyond. At first I needed five stops to get up the hill to Erts (it's such a modest slope that when driving you hardly notice it, let alone change gear) but even on a bike with 18 gears you soon learn about gradients.

According to legend, St. James, one of the apostles who accompanied Jesus Christ, was beheaded under the orders of Herod in 43AD and his body was carried by sea to the Galician town of Padron, from

where it was taken to Santiago. In the 9th century the tomb was re-discovered and a church built beside it in honour of the Saint. At first it was the local Christians who came to visit Santiago but soon monks and others followed. Such was the popularity that there were four different routes across France and the Camino Jacobea

(or the Chemin de St. Jacques) came to be known across Spain as the French Road. It was particularly popular in the 11th and 12th centuries when the Asturian monarchs took St. James (Sant Iago) as their patron saint and protector against the Moors. St. James is portrayed in two different guises along the camino, he is mainly a pilgrim with a stick and scallop shell but he also appears as Santiago Matamoros, a slayer of the Moors. After Rome

and Jerusalem, Santiago was the most visited shrine by medieval pilgrims and the route also offered penitance and a pardon for sins. Pilgrims of all types came, from kings (French and Spanish) to saints (St. Francis of Assissi) also pagans, jews, heretics, the idle, vagabonds, artists, traders, the good, the wicked and whores.

A pilgrimage is a ritual journey, undertaken alone or as part of a group, with the aim of achieving purification, perfection or salvation; it's a religious experience in which a series of bonds are established, between a place of this world and a higher sphere, between the person and being purified by the consummation of his goal. Even Chaucer remarked "People long to go on pilgrimage, And palmers for to seek the stranger strands. Of distant saints hallowed in

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sundry lands". Apart from religious reasons pilgrims today go for cultural reasons, to see the historic, artistic and aesthetic relics, or for ecological reasons, to get away from their world, the pollution, noise, etc., and sociologically, to mix with others from all walks of life.

At the end of April we duly got ourselves, bikes and equipment together, loaded the car and were driven to St. Jean de Pied Port, on the French side of the Pyrenees, by a concerned husband for the start of our journey. That first night was quite difficult as we had said our goodbyes, we'd done so much planning

beforehand but were about to embark on a venture, not knowing what the days would be like, we were still unfit but gung-ho to get there and experience the camino.

The first day it drizzled for most of the time, we pushed our bikes up the road for what seemed almost all of the 23kms along and up 850m, but we did get the time to appreciate the unfolding beech leaves, inspect the wild flowers along the wayside and chat to other

pilgrims. The Route Napolean through the trees is described as being spectacular for walkers (27kms) but it can take 12 hours for the less fit and is not suitable in bad weather. Arriving at Roncesvalles in Spain we checked into the first of the refugios or hostels, this was operated by a monastery and it was our first introduction into pilgrim life. There were a couple of dormitories with bunk beds in pretty close proximity 15 bunk beds in a room, (i.e. thirty people), two rooms, mixed sex dormitory and mixed-sex facilities which included two squat toilets, 3 showers and a communal sink for washing face, teeth-cleaning and sockwashing. Lights out and locked up at 10pm. Extra bodies slept on mattresses on the floor, although a youth hostel in another part of the monastery building took another 100. We had met a retired Swiss couple during the first day; they had retired from work a couple of days before and were determined to walk the Camino and to take whatever time they needed (anything from a month minimum to two months


or so). The look on their faces was a picture at the sight of the dormitory - Swiss cleanliness, it certainly wasn't. We were all invited to attend mass at 6pm, it was a moving service with a special blessing for the one hundred plus pilgrims about to start out on the camino. Earlier we had completed questionnaires and during the service the priest read out all the countries of the participating pilgrims, there were at least twenty different countries that night.

We had supper in a local restaurant, but being Spain it didn't open until 8.30pm so we had to eat fairly quickly and be back inside the monastery before 10pm.

About twelve feet away from the dormitory window was a large clock and it noisily struck all the quarters as well as the hours. People got up all night long, so the lights went on and off in the toilet area, along with looflushing, door-creaking (the kindest donation of all would have been to leave a tin of WD40 at every hostel) people coughing, grunting, snoring, sneezing, and then at 5.30am they started getting up, wrapping everything in plastic bags,

pulling on boots and departing long before the first café was open. It was still dark outside but people were in a rush to get to the next hostel to ensure they could get a bed. This was our first night on the Camino and we did wonder what we had taken on.

Being on bikes we were second-class pilgrims, some beds were only available after the walkers had checked in or after 8pm at night. Some places just didn't accept bikes at all, so we had to take an hotel room in Pamplona, Burgos and a few other places but it did give us the chance to do some washing and get most of it dry before moving on. The Basque country was very interesting, surprisingly neat and tidy villages and a far cry from the Spain of the south. We looked at churches, cloisters, cathedrals, abbeys, monasteries, convents, Roman arches, Gothic arches, fallen arches, dropped arches, biblical scenes, crosses, Virgin and







child statues, excruciating statues of Christ, but some churches had wonderful carvings either in wood for the choir stalls or in stonework on the portals. Some royal tombs had truly wonderful carvings done in marble, such that you could almost feel the fabric it was so delicately wrought. We saw ancient bridges spanning rivers, marvelled at the detail on capitals above pillars or on roof joists, saw where the Knights Templars had travelled, and had so much history and religion in three weeks that it was enough to make the head spin.

The food was pretty good, we could get a sustaining pilgrim lunch or dinner for 1,000pts wine included and at the first downpour of rain we would

repair to a café for a sandwich and coffee. We felt it was our duty to sample and differentiate between the local bakery products at whatever time of day. We met a lot of interesting people, all nationalities, and we've been able to compare notes later by email from Brazil to South Africa. We met a Dutch lady who had taken fourteen years to get to Santiago, taking a fortnight off each year and doing what she could in that

time and then starting off from that point the following year, Spaniards who were walking each weekend, French families who did five day stints before returning to work. We also met people with horrendous foot problems, such that they'd been hospitalised and told to rest for a week or so before being allowed back on the camino.

One of the highlights of the trip was listening to the monks chanting at St. Domingo de Silos (their CD having made the hit parade a few years back). We arrived at the monastery in time for the 7pm Vespers service. After the service my friend chatted up one of the brothers and he invited us to stay in one of the guest units (but not in the monastery itself, you understand, as that was male only). We were then invited back at 9.20pm for Compline and to hear the monks chant the Ave Maria which was sung in the very beautiful 12C cloisters. There was just us two, three

men in retreat at the monastery and the monks chanting. It was almost as though they were chanting just for us. There were just a few lights illuminating an altar and a couple of the arches of the cloister and the whole experience was most moving, particularly at sunset. The service was completed in the church where just a couple of candles were lit and we were the only congregation.

We journeyed through a variety of scenery from forests, vineyards to green wheat fields; long, boring, dusty plains, gravel tracks, main roads, cities, four mountain passes and saw an incredible variety of wild flowers, at least two hundred species. I started to

log them but soon ran out of names so started to draw them. We had a day of tree heathers and white broom, of asphodels, poppies, cistus and peonies. The cities were as interesting as the countryside: Pamplona, Estella, Burgos with its excellent bike trails across the city, Leon with its fantastic 12C monastery of San Marcos (now a Parador), Astorga and Santiago. We slept in some good refugios, some grotty hotel rooms, one

night in a caravan, and a couple of places run by priests where hygiene was non-existent but their sheer character, independence and friendliness made up for any shortfalls. We cycled against head winds, in cloud, mist, sunshine, rain and dust.

We arrived in Galicia under a low cloud and it rained for the next four days. Its landscape compares to other Celtic centres like Ireland, Cornwall and Brittany, i.e. green and grey. We had a miserably damp night in a monastery building in Samos and the great photo I didn't take was of a group of pilgrims the next morning waiting at the bus stop for the 8.15am bus to take them to Sarria. My feet were permanently wet in sopping shoes and they only dried out on the fourth night when we came to a radiator.

Arriving in Santiago de Compostela was quite something. The Cathedral is huge and has two large ornate towers at the front, magnificent 16C stone

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carvings on the various portals, but overall there's this great feeling of achievement, the fact that you've arrived. You've survived the road, all those interminable uphill sections, the weather from sunburn to solid rain, some pretty awful sleeping conditions, and there were times when I wondered just what had been so awful in my past life that merited such treatment now, but all that was forgotten when you arrive at this huge square and see the cathedral. We attended the twelve noon pilgrim mass and found there was standing room only. It was a Holy Year so you got more absolution for your sins (or you have to do less penitence for the same amount of sin). A Holy Year is when St. James' day on the 25th July falls on a Sunday and when this happens the great doors of Puerta Santa of the cathedral are opened and the huge silver incense burner is swung at pilgrim masses. It takes eight men to pull the rope to get it to move and then it swings through a 50m arc and nearly touches the ceiling on each swing. Santiago, the city, is very pleasant with its narrow streets and centuries of history and the pilgrimage but much tat in the name of religion is sold to tourists from plastic saints to wooden Santiago staffs.

My faithful husband drove to Santiago to collect me and whilst in the area we drove to Finisterre. It was a lovely sunny day and it was nice to see the Atlantic ocean; we had a good fish lunch on the way. A fitting end. Would I do the journey again? Yes,

there are parts like the Route Napoleon that I would love to return to and walk, and there are selected places that I could happily spend more time in and churches steeped in history that were locked until an hour before the evening mass that are worth returning to see. On the other hand there are parts that I was glad I was cycling through; the bikes allowed us to do the distances and deviate from the path to see other attractions. It was also nice to park them and walk around the cities stretching other sets of muscles. We met many walkers striding along who were too tired at the day's end to see many of the sights at their destination. I'm thankful I had Gore-tex, good shoes, a credit card and 'phone which doesn't quite compare with the hair shirt of old.

The year 2000 has been decreed another Holy Year. Even if you do not make it on a pilgrimage the city and cathedral of Santiago is well worth visiting even though it is 1,170kms away. I've not described the cathedral in any great detail but the craftsmanship is quite sumptuous. There's the magnificent Portico de la Gloria an elaborately sculptured doorway of 1188, the tree of Jesse where holes have worn through the statue by the many fingers of pilgrims touching it in reverence and thanks for their safe arrival, the statue of St. James where you kiss the brass scallop on the back in the tradition of "hugging the apostle" and even the bones in the crypt to revere.




