

### THE OMBUDSMAN



# THE INTERNATIONAL SINGERS

'ENERGY! SPARKLE! SMILE! ROUND SOUND! LISTEN TO EACH OTHER! WATCH ME! HAVE FUN!'

his is the list that Barbara holds up to us before every concert. Energy? Boy! That woman has more energy and inspiration in her little finger than the rest of us put together. Which is probably what pulled us through this year's hectic Christmas schedule, a schedule which frankly stirred a few rumblings of revolt among the Singers. To please Mossèn Josep Maria, I'd booked our first concert, in Fener Church, on the Eve of Purissim - the night before the notorious grid-locked traffic jams. We'd chosen the Saturday of Purissim to sing at El Castell Hotel in la Seu (on the calculation - later proved correct - that few people would be driving that day. Sadly, the traffic police feared otherwise which put the wind up us and we nearly all arrived early.) Then there was the concert at the Residencia Sola d'Enclar on Three Kings and finally our concert in La Seu Cathedral on Sunday 7th January, the day when thousands of Spanish families were due to leave Andorra for the start of school the following day ... All things considered, we had remarkably few problems.

Singing in El Castell and the Cathedral for the first time was a great experience for us with the El Castell performance being perhaps the better, but the cathedral the more exciting. We now have digital recordings of all four concerts and Brian Keep will see if he can cut a CD for us using the best versions of each song. Watch this

The concert at El Castell raised 122,000pts for the handicapped people's day centre in La Seu (the hotel management generously gave their share of the ticket sales, meant to cover refreshments, to the centre.) 61,000pts went towards our blouses. The concerts in Fener and Ordino raised approximately 90,000pts for charity most of which went to a parish couple in need: she has cancer and he has a psychiatric illness. Revenue from sales of advertising in the programmes came to 116,000pts with a few people kindly making donations. Our very sincere thanks to everyone for being so generous.

Barbara, Binnie and I have so far spent 13 hours sifting through our large archive of music looking for the very best and most varied programme for next spring. Our first concert will, at the invitation of La Massana Comú, be on Sunday, May 6th in La Massana church at 7.30pm. Hope to see you there. Dates for our other concerts have yet to be decided.

Now I'd like to introduce you to our Singers from northern Europe.

Pop Goldsteen, born in Holland in the midtwenties, grew up in a musical family and learnt several instruments, though singing to her lute became her final love. With the universities closed during World War II, Pop took an office job. Then, during her first marriage, she trained as a physiotherapist and started her own practice. At that point, to preserve the sensitivity of her fingertips for her work, she abandoned the lute. Her second husband died in 1983 and Pop moved to Andorra in 1987. She joined the Singers a few weeks after their inception in 1989. Once the choir joined the International Club, Pop acted as Group Leader for 18 months. Having, at that time, a wide vocal range she also kindly volunteered to sing alto along with just two others. (Today there are nine.)

Otti Hoebig grew up near Frankfurt. At school she was keen on competitive swimming and gymnastics as well as embroidery. She moved to Andorra with her young family of three children in 1974. She gives German lessons and sometimes guides German tourists around Andorra. A great organiser, Otti has arranged a soirée and ball for the Hapsburgs, a charity evening of music and dance for the Josep Carreras Leukaemia Foundation and has since arranged a scholarship for one of the show's stars, 11 year old Leila, to train with the Vienna State Ballet. She sang with the Orfeó and Sant Antoni choirs before joining the Singers in 1993. She is always looking for new venues for our concerts.

Leela Herriman grew up in and around Amsterdam, then won a Foreign Student Scholarship to Bryn Mawr

# THE WINE GROUP

I wish to raise my glass to Simon Binsted who is our new Leader of The Wine Group and is suitably qualified, so we discovered last November at the San Andreu Hotel in Arinsal. Not just because he likes the occasional glass of wine like the rest of us! But I understand Simon has had a previous 'life of wine'. Simon was once employed as a 'Courtier en Vins' within the Burgundy area of France. Loosely translated, this title meant Simon was an agent asked to purchase X amount of wine, to then assemble and sell on to the buyer. This job obviously meant seeking good wines and tasting them.

So, on the snowy evening of November 17th last

year, there were approximately 40 eager participants who attended the Wine Tasting Group, that meant an excellent start for Simon. We were welcomed with a glass of Penedes Jane Venture Brut Nature being one of 14 wines on the list supplied by a local wholesaler, Gastronomia P B P of Santa Coloma. Once everyone had found a seat and was happily nibbling at the cheese and biccies also provided, Simon started by explaining how there are rules that should be followed to be able to appreciate each wine fully.

- Look at the colour of the wine
- 2 Take less than a mouthful of the wine
- 3 Curl your tongue slightly to enable all your taste buds and senses to be aroused by the wine
- 4 Part your lips sufficiently to allow air in but not to let the wine fall out
- 5 Whilst enjoying this moment try to conjure up the words to describe the flavours
- 6 Spit into the bucket provided

There is good reason for point number 5. I understand that once you have swallowed a wine your taste buds do not react in the same way thereafter, so it is advisable to hold the wine in your mouth long enough to actually savour the taste and then release. Simon pointed out that this is how a professional would sample wine perhaps up to 100 in one tasting; it also avoids the embarrassing situation of falling over in front of your colleagues and friends!

The selection of wine we tasted came from different areas within Spain, of all colours including 'young' and 'old'. The idea of point number 4 was to hear from the group the various flavours our brains had interpreted from our taste buds. Quite entertaining comments from "it's organic with no smell at all", "meaty", "rotting veggies", "fruity", "far too dry", to "can I have another glass?" Ben from Gastronomia together with Simon guided us through the list by tasting each wine, discussing its flavour, colour, why it should taste a particular way perhaps due to how the wine had been matured, such as a Crianza meaning the wine has been aged in oak casks for a minimum of one year; or it may depend upon the soil it had grown in, for example the

Priorat group of wine comes from vineyards built on granite rock; also the rainfall and hours of sunshine within an area and if the wine had been blended, etc, etc.

I picked up other snippets of useful information such as how to store wine, temperatures for your cellar and service, how to read a label and decide which wines to 'lay down'. For a wine enthusiast, this group is a must.

It was decided that future meetings would be held on a quarterly basis, so why not get a group together for the next meeting which will be sometime around March (Simon to advise). Members' entrance fee at 1250 pts and Non Members' entrance at 1500 pts.

All in all an excellent evening which I thoroughly enjoyed. A time to meet and listen to the professionals and to discuss and learn something new about wine.


# THE ART GROUP

# **OBITUARY OF CHARLES ALLEN**

Charles Ewart Allen was born 1898 in El Paso, U.S.A.
He moved to England in 1904 together with his parents. He was educated at Worcester Grammar School. In 1916 he joined the Royal Fusiliers and was sent to Northern France. He fought in a horrible war in the trenches – he often talked about this part of his terrible experience. Later he joined the British occupational forces in Cologne, where he married my mother in 1923.

He started his career with the British Consulate in Cologne after he was discharged from the army in 1920. From Cologne he was transferred to Rotterdam in 1925 and in 1940 when the Germans invaded Holland we were rescued by the British Navy, who kindly brought us to Tilbury on 14th May, 1940. For a while my father worked in the Mercantile Marine Office at Avonmouth.

In 1944 he was sent to Lourenço Marques in Portuguese East Africa by the Foreign Office. However, he returned to the U.K. at the end of 1945 and was then enrolled in the Control Commission for Germany. In 1946, together with his colleagues, he opened the British Consulate General in Hamburg. In 1954 he was transferred to New York where he finally retired in 1958.

He spent most of his retired life in Portugal. Unfortunately my mother died in 1978 and Father lived in Portugal for 4 years by himself. Then he lived for 8 years in Germany with his sister-in-law. When his sister-in-law became ill he decided to come and live in Andorra. He had a very interesting life here in Andorra, playing bridge twice a week, but unfortunately at the age of 97 his eyes deteriorated to such an extent that he became virtually blind.

He passed away on 8th November, 2000.

# **OUR AMAZON ADVENTURE (Part 1)**

The mere mention of the River Amazon conjures up visions in most of us of really far away, remote places deep, deep in the dense rain forests of Amazonia where only the most intrepid of adventurers will dare to go. Well, of course, that exclusive group undoubtedly includes us! Having survived the rigours of life on this dangerous planet for more than seven and a half decades my wife and I decided to celebrate our Golden Wedding Anniversary, Christmas and the New Millennium all in one go by taking a trip up the Amazon

We left England on a grey December morning on a flight from Gatwick to Fort Lauderdale, Florida, where we took a three-day pre-cruise break in this fabulously wealthy city.

On 21st December 1999 we boarded the Stella Solaris, which would be our floating home for the next month. The Stella Solaris flew the Greek flag and was operated by Royal Olympic Cruises. The crew was nearly all Greek but everyone spoke English. The passengers were 95% Americans. Our Tour Operator was Jazzdagen Tours of Studio City California and it was responsible for approximately 60% of the passengers on our cruise. Jazzdagen also provided The New Reformation Jazz Band and the Peter Meijers Quartet with Guest Artist Bob Draga.

The kind of Stateroom chosen determined what we paid. Once outside the Stateroom all passengers were treated to the same 5-star luxury facilities. Of course, the whole ship was air-conditioned and the service excellent. We were not exactly going to 'rough it' on our Amazon Adventure. We had both had enough of 'roughing it' on our thirty years of missionary work in India!

We began our long voyage with two days at sea ploughing across the Caribbean. The weather was gorgeous, the sea calm and we started to make many friends amongst the approx. 570 passengers. There was something for everybody: dancing, a different cabaret and floor show every evening, a walk around the deck seven times = 1 nautical mile, a keep fit instructor, a fullyequipped gym, cocktails with the captain, a large cinema for movies, talks by Capt. Loren M. McIntyre, who is a famous Amazon Explorer and Naturalist, who discovered the source of the Amazon. Retired U.S. Ambassador Andrew Steigman gave us talks on diplomacy and politics and there was another expert on international finance and handicraft classes. Our Captain Apostolos Panorios took us on a visit to the bridge, etc., etc., you name it, there was something going on for it. The food was superb, the greatest problem not to eat too much of it.

On Christmas Eve our first port of call was St. Thomas, in the U.S. Virgin Islands which the Brits had sold to the Americans for a few warships during W.W.2. St. Thomas, apart from being a very beautiful tropical island is a very good place for shopping. Val and I took a submarine cruise and ventured 75 feet under the clear waters around Buck Island Natural Wildlife Refuge, marvelling at the beautiful fishes, coral and even a couple of sharks. We had never taken a trip in a submarine in our lives and it was an experience we shall never forget. The trip lasted one hour, there were large 20-inch portholes and an extra large 52-inch view-port at the front.

On Christmas Day we visited Soufrière and Castries on the island of Santa Lucia, then back on board to a sumptuous Christmas dinner. On the following day we visited Grenada, Barbados and Tobago, all in the Windward Islands. They were everything one imagined tropical islands to be, waving palms, silver sands, turquoise sea, azure skies and lush greenery. The natives all spoke English and were friendly. Many of these islands are British Commonwealth countries.

At 11.00 hrs on the last day of the Millennium we crossed the Equator at Macapa. Crossing the Equator involved us in all the usual good-humoured rituals. King Neptune (sorry, being a Greek ship, Poseidon) came on board accompanied by all his minions, selecting various victims (usually unfortunate members of the crew – no farepaying passenger!) to be shaved, sawn in half and ducked in the swimming pools. We took on board tow pilots who were to accompany us during the whole of our time up and down the Amazon. At times there would only be 4 ft of water under our keel and at other times we would have 350 ft beneath us. For this reason only smaller or




The Stella Solaris in Dock

The foregoing was, of course, merely a prelude to the climax of the whole voyage, our entry into the Amazon. We had not only entered the greatest river in the world, a first for all of us, but we were entering the New Millennium and this was the MILLENNIUM CRUISE and it would certainly not only be a first but a last and onceoff for every one of us on board, crew and passengers alike. Talk about Haute Cuisine, the Chief Chef himself and all his entourage came out from the hidden recesses of his galleys with a menu that hit the ceiling! # MONA DE PASQUA TRADITIONAL EASTER CAKE

A recipe from Maria Teresa Raurell, translated by Caroline Colvin Smith

Make a sponge cake with the following ingredients:

9 eggs 350 gr sugar 115 gr cornflower 115 gr flour 1 packet of baking powder

Divide it into two round pieces

Make a syrup with:

8 tablespoons of water a little lemon juice 150 gr of sugar

Let it cool a little.

Lightly beat 8 egg yolks (keep the whites for some other use), and put them into a small pan. Add the cold syrup and on low heat, keep stirring in the same direction to obtain a thick creamy mixture. Spread half of this over one round piece. Cover with the other round piece. Spread the rest of the cream over the cake. In the middle of the mona, put a chocolate egg. Decorate the cake with 250 gr of glacé fruit (sold in little boxes in "Magatzems Pyrenées" or in cake shops), cut into small pieces, arranging the colours artistically.

Heat a small pan of 250 gr of apricot jam to a fine purée with 2 tablespoons of sugar and 6 of water and bring to the boil, until it is well mixed. Spread it over the cake and all around the sides. Cover the sides of the cake with ground almonds.

This sort of mona originally comes from Barcelona, but nowadays they are made everywhere in Catalonia and one can find a beautiful display of them in the cake shops in Andorra a few days before Easter.

Traditionally the **mona** is given by godfathers to their godsons for Easter and the godmothers give them the palm leaves to be blessed on Palm Sunday.

# ANOTHER LETTER FROM MOJACAR

Doreen Woolton keeps us up-to-date with life in the south of Spain

Autumn saw more rain than usual for Mojacar, but it also gave us a bonus with a "mini" Spring just before Christmas. Lots of plants and shrubs thought it was flowering season again and the place did look very summery.

Taking advantage of this warm weather I made a 4 day trip to the Alpujarras – this place always reminds me of how Andorra must have looked 50 years ago. Lots of tiny villages branching off from the one through road. It is the seaward side of the Sierra Nevada and you can arrive there from Mojacar after an easy 2 – 3 hours' drive.

Gerald lived in Yegen in the Alpujarras in the early 1920's and returned there several times during his long life. It is almost safe to say he was one of the first writers to put Spain on the tourist map. I visited his house and he is very much revered in the area. I am sure little has changed in the village buildings since he lived there. I think one would certainly pay more than 200 pesetas for the annual rental of a large house, which was the amount he paid! To continue on the Gerald Brenan theme, he died in 1987 at the age of 92 and was only recently buried in Malaga next to his wife. Apparently, he had been kept in formaldehyde at one of the universities since his death and was said to be in "excellent condition" before his burial!!

Trevelez is the highest inhabited village in Spain and it was delightful sitting in brilliant sunshine eating delicious jamon from the area which boasts many 'secaderos' or drying houses. Jamon, honey, jams and almond meringues are all specialities of the area. You can see from these products how similar to Andorra the area is, but the drive from the coast to the mountains is less than 60 kms. Were you to continue along the road instead of turning off to the Alpujarran villages you would arrive in Granada after another 50 kms.

Christmas passed beautifully here and the weather was good if a little windy, our joint Carol Service with the local Spanish community being one of the highlights. As a congregation they don't sing, but they do have a ladies' choir and a flamenco group playing and singing their carols. This year we had our church choir who were very good and, of course, the whole congregation sang well-

known carols. I shall never get used to people clapping in church but that must be my boring church upbringing. The Spaniards certainly enjoy themselves.

New Year was spent in Seville and again in lovely warm weather. This is a beautiful city and the people are delightful as they are comfortable with foreigners, the city having been a busy port for centuries. The ships come up the Guadalquivir to Seville from the Americas and from the East. New Year's Eve found us in a flamenco club where the locals, Japanese, Italians really knew how to enjoy themselves. Seville is attractive: whichever season you choose to visit.

Reading the above letter I realise I haven't spoken too much about Mojacar, but living here permanently it is good to travel to the surrounding areas when it is cooler because Andalucia is hot during the summer months and that is when you can "kick back" and enjoy Mojacar with its fiestas, chiringuitos and the veraneantes. I am looking forward to it.

# FESTA MAGNA -BIG DAY FOR THE OLD FOLKS

It was early last year, 28th September, compared with the normal timing of October or November. Invitations are sent out by the Minister of Health and Welfare to all holders of the Tarja Magna, issued on request by the Ministry to any resident over 65, regardless of nationality. To actually participate in a Festa Magna you need to go to your local Llar a week or two in advance and pay out a mere 1000 pesetas for your ticket.

The first part of this annual event is a Solemn Mass at the Sanctuary of Our Lady of Meritxell, the second part a lunch and dance at the Sport and Sociocultural Centre of Encamp. All of us are brought in by coach from our towns and villages, except for a few who prefer to use their own transport – the coach fare is, of course, included in the 1000 pesetas. As usual, last year's event was attended by the Cap de Govern, Marc Forné, and by the Minister of Health and Welfare, Josep Goicoechea, both of whom made speeches. Again, as usual, it was well reported on Andorra Television and in the printed media – as I write there are something like thirty photographs to look at and we have decided to reproduce one or two with permission. There are between 700 and 800 of us, which means that a few are obliged to stand during the church service.

A good lunch, not too heavy, with plentiful supplies of red and white wine, cava, coffee and liqueurs to finish with. Tables seat 8 or 10 people, and each village has its own group of tables, at which we sit where we please. These photographs provide an idea of the agreeable informality of the atmosphere. Do not worry about not being able to speak Catalan – to my shame I do not yet speak it – there will be people at your table who speak French or Spanish, but do not expect to find speakers of English.

In the course of his speech Marc Forné announced that all holders of the Tarja Magna would in future be able to travel for free on the bus network of Andorra. There are other advantages, such as reductions in the cost of tickets to the National Auditorium in Ordino or to the Congress Centre in Andorra la Vella, and participation in trips organised by the Comuns.

Finally, the dancing, for which see the final photograph. Those who have not yet been to a Festa Magna might be surprised at the energy shown by the dancers, all over 65. A very lively orchestra of seven musicians and three singers helped to invigorate us. Among the music played I recognised Chattanooga Choochoo, In the Modd, Duke Ellington's "Caravan", and that most exciting of all pasa dobles "El Gato Montes".

Not many Club Members, I am sorry to say, less than ten. I don't know of better value for 1000 pesetas in Andorra, and it's a good way of integrating ourselves into the country in which we have chosen to live. Hope to see more of us there this year.

# THE MEMORY OF THE PRINCIPALITY

In that year 1933, Albert Lebrun was the French Co-Prince and Monseigneur Juan Guitort, the Prince-Bishop. They were both going to remember the social and political tension then present in the Principality. Today, perhaps, some Andorrans in their 90's still remember it. Firstly because in 1933 universal suffrage became the norm in Andorra; "universal" is not the right word, for in effect only men of 25 could vote and only those aged 30 or more could be elected. Andorran women had to wait until 1970 to obtain, in this domain, equality with men. During the second World War, universal suffrage was suppressed, and one reverted to the previous system, when only males heads of families could vote. But in 1946 the universal suffrage granted by the Co-Princes on 19th August 1933 was re-established.

Before that time, in the early months of 1933, the institutional structure had been seriously troubled by what several historians had called the Andorran revolution of 1933. The Council General had reached agreement on several matters without informing the delegates of the Co-Princes. The Tribunal des Corts, "competent to recognise when the Council General exceeded its authority", declared it in rebellion against the Co-Princes, "the supreme authority in the Valleys". And for disobedience to the sovereign powers, the Tribunal ordered the dissolution of the Council General.

At the same time, to emphasise his full authority, the French Co-Prince sent to Andorra a contingent of 50 gendarmes, armed and in uniform, under the orders of Colonel René Baulard – with the full agreement of the Prince Bishop. The French and Episcopal Viguiers were promoted by the two sovereigns to be "extraordinary commissioners for the provisional administration of the Valleys". And the Co-Princes called a new general election for the 31st August 1933.

But the rebellion against sovereign authorities continued. The deposed Council General refused this instruction, and proclaimed that it would punish severely those who would stand against it, recalling that it was the only authority in Andorra. It was a declaration of war! In

the parishes also, confusion reigned. The Consuls protested against the entry of the gendarmes, considered as a violation of the rights of Andorrans. But that was all. On 31st August there took place the elections ordered by the Co-Princes to choose the members of the new Council General, who a few days later took the oath of allegiance to the two sovereigns.

That did not prevent, during those weeks in 1933, from the side of the rebels, the expression, hardly concealed, of the wish that the Andorran people ought to be the real and only sovereign. Is not that what Article 3 of the first chapter of the Constitution was going to proclaim 60 years later?

Still in 1933, before the events we have just described, the Council General granted in April, without passing through the Co-Princes, a concession to a Spaniard of Barcelona, allowing him to set up in Andorra a Casino, for various games of chance. They did not allow for Monseigneur Guitort and the strict ideas of the Church. The concession had hardly been signed before it was quickly forgotten in the confusion of the rebellion.

There was too another rebellion in 1933, that of the Spanish workmen who were constructing the electric generating plant in Escaldes. Dissatisfied with their working conditions, they went on strike for almost a month. Strikes were not tolerated in Andorra, so the conflict was resolved by expelling its leaders from the country.

Another significant event in 1933 was the creation of the first police force in Andorra, consisting of six agents and their chief. Not many, but at the time Andorra contained only 3,671 Andorrans and 368 foreigners, a total of 4,039 inhabitants.

Recall also that in that year there were no newspapers in the country, nor was there liberty of expression. On the other hand, much was written abroad about Andorra. Isabella Sandy, a writer of Ariège in France, had already published the famous "Andorra, or the Men of Bronze". This successful book was translated into several languages, including an American edition by Houghton Mifflin. Rudyard Kipling wrote to the author to say how much he had enjoyed her book, which he had read several times. It was thanks to him that among the first visitors to Andorra were some Americans on muleback.

Finally, in a Toulouse newspaper of 10th October of that year 1933, terrible for Andorra, one can read that on the previous day, 9th October, after a military parade, Colonel Baulard and his fifty gendarmes recrossed the frontier, their mission accomplished.

Calm had returned to the Valleys of Andorra.




